

# Admission GUIDELINES

The difference between two- and four-year UW campuses.

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Two-Year Branch Campuses are campuses of access well-suited for students who seek an associate degree, want to test the waters of post-secondary education, prefer to live at home before transferring to a Four-Year Campus, or are returning adults. Two-Year Branch Campuses are a great springboard toward further academic study and a fulfilling professional life.

Four-Year Campuses offer a comprehensive educational experience for students who are interested in – and prepared for – a more rigorous academic setting. A degree from a Four-Year Campus can position students for graduate-level programs and help them develop into strong candidates for professional consideration.

## TWO-YEAR CAMPUS ADMISSIONS

As campuses of access, Two-Year Branch Campuses accept all ACT/SAT scores, consider similar non-academic factors in admissions, and offer the benefit of directly transferrable credits to Four-Year Campuses.

## FOUR-YEAR CAMPUS ADMISSIONS

Academic factors for admission to Four-Year Campuses include high school class rank, GPA, trends in grades, senior year courses, test scores, and course rigor. Nonacademic factors considered include leadership, special achievements, service, diversity in personal background, and experience. An essay (or essays, for select campuses) is required, and at least one letter of recommendation from an academic source is highly encouraged.

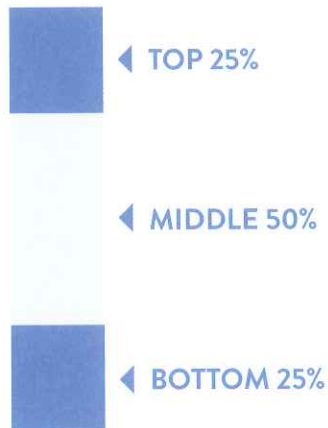
